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RULES OF THE SOCIETY.

I.—That the Society be called the “WILLIAM SALT ARCHÆOLOGICAL SOCIETY.”

II.—The leading object of the Society shall be the editing and printing of original documents relating to the County of Stafford, to which, however, may be added papers selected by an Editorial Committee, illustrative of the same, or coming under any of the eight following heads:—

- (a) Abstracts of the Monastic Chartularies, and of Ancient Family Deeds, with the names of witnesses and fac-similes of seals; Genealogies of Nobility and Gentry (accompanied by proofs), Heraldic Visitations, and other papers touching the general history and descent of properties and families.
- (b) Printing and editing of the Public Records relating to the County, including the Exchequer or Pipe Rolls, the Assize Rolls, Fine Rolls, Inquisitions, Perambulations of Forests, Subsidy Rolls, and Assessments, &c., &c.
- (c) History of Parishes and of Manors, and of Manorial Customs and Tenures, illustrated by Copies of, or reference to, original grants.
- (d) Church Notes hitherto unpublished, such as Ecclesiastical Surveys, Extracts from Episcopal and Parish Registers, Copies of Epitaphs, and Description of Monuments and Ecclesiastical Buildings, Abstracts or Copies of Wills, &c.
- (e) Notices of British and Roman Remains and Roads and Buildings, and the Antiquities generally of the District.
- (f) Autograph Letters and other Documents relating to the Civil War.
- (g) Notices of distinguished Writers, Broadside, Election Squibs, &c.
- (h) Correspondence, in which enquiries may be made and answered, on any of the above subjects, and miscellaneous information, including corrections of errors.

III.—The general affairs of the Society shall be managed by a Council of ten, of whom five shall be trustees of the William Salt Library, and nominated by them, from time to time, and five shall be elected at an Annual Meeting of the Subscribers. The Council shall be empowered to delegate, if they see fit, the selection of the papers to be printed, to an Editorial Committee. Of the Council, three shall be a quorum, and in case of equality of votes, their Chairman shall have a casting vote.

IV.—The Officers of the Society shall be a Treasurer, a Secretary, and an Auditor, to be appointed by the Council. These Offices shall be honorary, but the Council shall have power to appoint an Assistant Secretary to be paid at the discretion of the Council, as the nature of his duties may warrant.

V.—The Subscription shall be One Guinea annually, to be paid in advance, upon the first of January in each year, and such annual payment shall entitle each Subscriber to the volume issued for the year of such subscription. Any Subscriber shall be permitted to withdraw from the Society by giving notice of his intention three months before the termination of any year of Subscription.

N.B.—To save trouble, it is recommended that the Members of the Society pay their subscriptions to the Society's bankers by revocable order upon their own bankers, a printed form for which may be obtained from the Assistant Secretary.

GENERAL MEETING, 8TH NOVEMBER, 1904.

THE Twenty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Society was held on the 8th of November, 1904, at the William Salt Library, Stafford. The Chair was occupied by the President, Lord Wrottesley, and the following members and friends of the Society were present:—Sir Charles Wiseley, Sir Reginald Hardy, the Ven. Archdeacon Lane, the Rev. E. Collett, the Rev. S. W. Hutchinson, the Rev. S. Lees, Rev. F. P. Parker, the Rev. E. Salt, the Rev. R. A. Wilson, the Rev. F. J. Wrottesley, and Messrs. S. B. Bamford, W. S. Brough, W. F. Carter, G. Gil, W. R. Holland, N. Joyce, W. N. Landor, J. E. Mitchell, Major-General the Hon. G. Wrottesley, the Honorary Secretary, and Mr. J. W. Bradley, the Assistant Secretary.

The Report of the Assistant Secretary was read as follows:—

Against this list of losses, we have to record that Sir Thomas A. Salt succeeds his late father in his membership. Miss Burne has resumed her connection with the Society after a lapse of three years, and has paid for the arrears created by her withdrawal as well as this year's subscription. Mr. W. F. Carter, who withdrew in 1902, has requested to be re-instated, and secured the volumes issued since his withdrawal.

The Doughton Free Library has also become a subscriber and has bought several back volumes.

These new members nearly balance the losses of the year, the net loss being five members only.

The financial position of the Society is satisfactory, the balance in the bank on October 15th being £108. At the same period last year it was £110. Five subscribers have continued their voluntary extra half guinea subscription, making the total from this source £101 16s. 5d.

The Report of the Editorial Committee was read by the Honorary Secretary as follows :—

The Editorial Committee submit a report and balance sheet for the past year. Volume VII, New Series, was issued to the Subscribers in July, 1904, and another Volume for 1905 is now in the press. The new Volume will contain the Register of Bishop Stretton, who was Bishop of Lichfield and Coventry between the years 1360-1385. It has been abstracted into English by the Rev. R. A. Wilson from the original Record at Lichfield.

After it had been decided at the last meeting of the Society to print the Episcopal Registers as a continuous series, a letter was sent, at the suggestion of the Bishop of Lichfield, addressed to the Secretary of the Canterbury and York Society, which had been formed for the printing of the same Records, proposing that the two Societies should co-operate in the work. This letter was laid before the Committee of the Canterbury and York Society, but it appeared that the latter Society had decided to print the Registers in the original Latin text ; as Mr. Wilson's abstracts were in English, any idea of co-operation between the two Societies had to be abandoned. The ancient diocese, however, comprised all Derbyshire and Cheshire, and parts of Warwickshire and Lancashire in addition to the present diocese. It was

therefore considered advisable to issue a circular to the clergy and laity of the districts comprised within the limits of the old diocese drawing their attention to the proposed scheme; and the following memorandum was accordingly drawn up and sent to all the beneficed clergy and justices of the peace within the above limits.

THE EPISCOPAL REGISTERS AT LICHFIELD.

The William Salt Archæological Society, which was founded in 1879, has for nearly a quarter of a century issued annual Volumes bearing upon the History of the County of Stafford. It is now proposed, with the permission of the Lord Bishop of Lichfield, to print English abstracts of the Episcopal Registers at Lichfield in a continuous series, of which the first Volume will be issued about the middle of 1905.

The Bishops' Registers begin between six and seven centuries ago, and contain not only the names of the clergy presented to the various benefices, but many matters illustrative of the Canon Law, church services, and the manners and customs of the times. In the licences for oratories and chapels, the ownership of many manors is incidentally shown, and in the Ordination Lists and Institutions will be found the patronage and tenure of the various benefices within the diocese.

The form in which the Registers will be issued is an English abstract of the Latin original, the degree of condensation depending upon the nature of the entry, but in no case will any fact or name of person or place be intentionally omitted. The Volumes, of not less than 300 pages, will be fully indexed, and will form a complete directory to the originals at Lichfield.

The Diocese in the middle ages consisted of all Derbyshire, Staffordshire, and Cheshire, part of Shropshire (the Archdeaconry of Salop and the Deanery of Bridgenorth), Warwickshire (the Archdeaconries of Coventry and Birmingham), and Lancashire (south of the Ribble).

In order to afford those who are interested in the parishes of the former Diocese outside the County of Stafford, an opportunity of procuring the records relating to their counties and parishes, the William Salt Society will publish their abstracts of the Lichfield Diocesan Registers in a separate form, to be issued at the rate probably of one Volume in two years. The price of each Volume will depend on the number of Subscribers,

but will not, in any case, exceed half-a-guinea, to be paid when the Volume is issued. It is proposed that these Volumes shall form the ordinary issue for the year to the present members of the Society, while the Volumes containing the Diocesan Registers alone will be issued to the special Subscribers. The Volume which it is proposed to issue next year is the Register of Bishop Robert de Stretton (1360-1385). The English abstract of this has been made by the Rev. R. A. Wilson, the Vicar of Hints, near Tamworth.

If you should desire to subscribe to this undertaking, the Committee of the William Salt Society would be much obliged by your signing the enclosed form and transmitting it to the Assistant Secretary, at the William Salt Library, Stafford.

The response to this circular has not been encouraging, for although over 2,000 circulars were posted, less than fifty answers have been received, notifying a wish to subscribe to the undertaking. The price named for each Volume, viz. half-a-guinea, was decided upon, on the advice of several of the clergy, who represented that the parochial clergy, with their small incomes, would not be likely to subscribe to a Volume of larger price, but the limit thus placed on the cost of the Volume will produce an anomaly at first sight, as the old subscribers will pay a guinea for the same Volume. It should, however, be borne in mind that the Society would have been bound under any circumstances to take advantage of the opportunity of printing these records, which have been hitherto unattainable owing to the difficulty of obtaining accurate copies or abstracts of documents of this description, whilst the subscriptions of the new members will more than cover the cost of the additional Volumes.

The Committee has also to report that the Rev. William Beresford has found an ancient copy of the Chartulary of Dieulacres Abbey in the possession of Mr. Arthur Parker of Leek. The Chartulary is a copy made by Benjamin Rudyerd in the reign of Charles I., and was discovered at Shirburn Castle amongst the Parker muniments. Lady Macclesfield sent it to her grandson, Mr. Arthur Parker, and the latter has very kindly lent it to the Committee to be printed by the Society. The Honorary Secretary is now engaged in taking a copy of it.

The Society has to deplore the loss of Sir Thomas Salt, who has served on the Committee for many years, who took an unflinching interest in their work, and to whom the Committee has been often indebted for useful advice.

Lord Wrottesley moved that the Report be adopted, and this was carried unanimously.

It was suggested that the Bishops' Registers should be issued in separate volumes and not mixed up with the lay records of the County, or other miscellaneous matters, and it was explained that this was the intention of the Committee.

Mr. Brough asked for information respecting the Dieulacres Chartulary and where the interest of it lay. The answer was the great antiquity of its contents, that the interest of it was in fact similar in kind to that of the Burton Chartulary and other monastic documents which had been previously printed by the Society.

The Chairman proposed that Sir T. A. Salt be elected a member of the Committee in place of his late father. This was seconded by Archdeacon Lane and carried unanimously.

It was announced that the Thoresby Society were willing to make an exchange of their Proceedings with the Society. This was approved subject to the consent of the Trustees of the Library.*

Major-General Wrottesley, observing that many of the Trustees of the Library were present, asked whether the copy of the Liber Albus, the earliest of the Bishops' Registers now in the Library, could be lent to the Committee for printing. The Trustees who were present were of opinion that it could be lent for that purpose and they would bring the matter before the next meeting of the Library Trustees.† Mr. Holland remarked that another copy of the book would have to be made, as the printer could not use it in its present form without defacing it. It was agreed that this would be necessary.

Archdeacon Lane proposed that the thanks of the meeting be given to the Chairman and the Honorary Secretary. This was carried unanimously, and after a brief reply from Lord Wrottesley the meeting separated.

P R E F A C E.

THIS volume is the first-fruits of a design for the calendaring or indexing of the Episcopal Registers of the see of Lichfield. When I began to work upon a Register, a summary of the contents seemed necessary, as a first step towards either index or calendar. At the Bishop's request communications were established with the Editorial Committee of the William Salt Historical Society, who readily undertook to publish records which have so important a bearing on the history of the county. To be relieved of the making of indices, and thus to have the work so greatly expedited, was a great gain, and I gladly placed the results of my work at the Society's disposal.

The choice of the fifth register, for publication first, needs explanation. It was known that the late Bishop Hobhouse had been at work on the earlier registers, but how much he had done could not be ascertained without some delay. To have attempted work already accomplished by him would have been more than folly. A register was therefore chosen which he was known not to have touched. It is a matter for deep regret that his MS. of Register No. 2 seems lost beyond hope of recovery, and that it must now be done by inferior hands, whosoever they are.

I fear that the absence of institutions¹ may cause some disappointment; and I regret that it has been impossible to include them in this volume. They are in a book by themselves, and are now being prepared for publication in the next issue.

As to the form chosen. An English abstract is not the ideal: but it has its advantages. Many entries in the original are wearisomely prolix, and contain much that does not repay the labour of reading. Others have the same facts repeated several

times in the various documents of which they are made up. It is in such entries that the utility of an abstract is most evident. In entries which do not admit of much condensation, the abstract becomes almost a translation, and the gain by condensation is small, while the opportunity for error is greater than in a transcript.

I should like to warn readers against over-confidence in the correctness of everything in the abstract. Those who are familiar with mediæval MSS. will not need any warning; but for the benefit of others, I would explain that not only are contractions freely used, and that not absolutely according to a definite rule, but also there is no difference in the form of the strokes which make up the letters *i*, *m*, *n*, *u*, and *v*, and the form of *c* and *t* are identical. In the case of words the sense will generally indicate the interpretation, but, in the names of persons and places, nothing but a knowledge of what the name really is can ensure correctness. I mention these things, not so much by way of apology, as in the hope that the remembrance of them may lead readers to detect for themselves the true form underlying my errors. I should be glad to have pointed out to me any errors which may be discovered, as well as identifications of difficult place-names, so that what is amiss may be set right in future.

In the Introduction I have given a life of the Bishop, for which I am indebted, almost entirely, to the *Dictionary of National Biography*, and a short account of some mediæval usages illustrated by the register. The Appendix of Religious Houses, though not so perfect as I could wish, will be found useful for identifying places mentioned, under various spellings, in the Ordination Lists.

The Index contains, I believe, every place occurring in the body of the register. It seemed inexpedient to cumber it with all the names in the Ordination Lists, and only the benefices have been included. The bishops who ordained, and the places where ordinations were held, will be found on pages vii. and xiii. of the Introduction.

In conclusion, I wish to express my thanks for much kindness and help: especially to the present occupant of the see, who has encouraged and promoted this attempt to disclose the acts of his

predecessors; to the Registrar of the diocese for his courtesy in making access to the originals so easy; to General the Hon. George Wrottesley, who has looked through the proof-sheets and given me the benefit of his great knowledge of local history; and to the Rev. F. P. Parker for much assistance in many matters.

I. Robert de Stretton, son of Robert Eyryk and Joanna his wife, was born at Stretton Magna in Leicestershire. His elder brother was Sir William Eyryk, from whom are descended the Heyricks of Leicestershire.

Having taken Orders, he became Chaplain to the Black Prince, to whose influence he appears to have owed his advancement. The following table shows the preferment obtained by him :—¹

On January 1st, 1358–9, Edward III, at the request of the Black Prince, nominated him to the see of Lichfield, vacant by the death of Roger de Northburgh. Archbishop Islip refused to consecrate him, on the ground of his lack of learning, and Pope Innocent VI, to whom he went to be examined, upheld the Archbishop's decision. The King would not give way, and the see remained vacant, the temporalities being in the King's hands. The Black Prince moved the Pope to refer the matter back to the Archbishop, who again examined Robert, and again rejected him. Finally, seeing no better way out of the difficulty, the Pope issued a Bull of Provision (22nd April, 1360), allowing Robert's election, and directing the Archbishop to consecrate him without examination. On September 26th, 1360, Robert's election was confirmed, and a commission issued to the Bishops of London and Rochester to consecrate, which they reluctantly did on the following day. The temporalities of the see had been restored on September 19th, and on February 6th, 1360–1, Robert de

² The Church of Llanbadarn Fawr was, on its vacation by Robert de Stretton, appropriated to Vale Royal Abbey. The appropriation was confirmed by the Pope Id. Nov. 1362.

Stretton made profession of canonical obedience to the Archbishop at Lambeth, *another reading his profession because he himself was not able to read.*¹

Although no scholar, he evidently had qualities which recommended him to the King, and the Black Prince. The Popes regarded him as a man of influence, for in 1355 he was instructed to assist the Papal Nuncio in preventing hostilities between England and France, and again, in August 1371, he was requested to procure from the King a safe-conduct to England for Cardinals Simon and John.

Much of his Episcopal work was done by assistant bishops. He did not administer Orders in person after Lent 1368; and in one case he made an unfortunate choice of an assistant bishop; for a doubt arose as to the regularity of his consecration, and, as no proof was forthcoming, the men who had received Orders at his hands were recalled and conditionally reordained. He would appear to have resided for the most part within his diocese, chiefly at his manor of Heywood in Staffordshire.

He founded Chantries at Stretton Magna, and at Stretton on Dunsmore, and renovated the shrine of S. Chad in the Lady Chapel of Lichfield Cathedral.

On September 7th, 1381, having become infirm and blind, he was ordered by the Chapter of Canterbury to appoint a coadjutor within 10 days.

He died at Heywood, March 28th, 1385, and was buried in Lichfield Cathedral on the north side of the shrine of S. Chad.² His will, dated March 19th, 1384-5, was proved at Lambeth April 10th (*Regr. of Archbp. Courtenay*).

II. THE DIOCESE of Coventry and Lichfield included within its bounds the whole of the counties of Chester, Derby, and Stafford, parts of the counties of Lancaster (all south of the Ribble), Salop (the Archdeaconry of Salop and the Deanery of Bridgnorth), Warwick (the Archdeaconries of Coventry and Birmingham), and Flint (the detached portion).

Commission from the Vicars General to Thomas¹ "Magnassiensis Episcopus" empowering him to perform the Episcopal offices, viz.:—to dedicate, reconcile, consecrate and bless churches, cemeteries, altars, both fixed and moveable, chalices, patens, vestments, and other ecclesiastical ornaments; to confer first tonsure and other minor orders; to minister the sacrament of confirmation; to hear confessions, enjoin penances, and give absolution, except for corruption of Nuns, perjury, and striking of clerks. Dated Coventry [*date illegible*] 1360.

Ordination of a Chantry in the Chapel of S. Mary of Osmundeston¹ in the Parish of S. Peter's, Derby, by Robert Fowcher of Osmundeston. Fol. 58. b.
The said Robert wishing to provide in his lifetime for the salvation of his soul and believing this may best be done by the daily memorial of the Passion of Christ, who by the hands of the Priest is offered to the Father on the altar, ordains a chantry for daily celebration by a priest for the founder while living and for his soul after death, and for his father's and mother's souls, and the souls of his ancestors and successors, his benefactors, and all the faithful departed, and the benefactors of the said chapel.

He grants ds. William de Tykenhale, priest, and his successors, chaplains of the said chantry, 4 messuages and 54 acres of arable land and 5 of meadow in the townships of Osmundeston and Normaston [Normanton], for the sustentation of the chantry; having first obtained the licence of the King and the other Lords concerned.

The possessions of the chantry may not be alienated either by the founder and his heirs or the priest and his successors, and under no circumstances may the chantry or its revenues be attached to the rectory of the parish. Fol. 59. a.

The presentation shall belong to the founder and his heirs, with lapse after one month to the Abbot and Convent of Derley [Darley], after a second month to the Prior and Convent of Repyndon [Repton], and after a third month to the Bishop.

The custody of the chantry during a vacancy shall belong to the founder and his heirs.

The priest when admitted shall swear to observe the ordinances of the chantry and not to attempt anything to the prejudice of the parish church. He shall have full possession of the goods and revenues of the chantry, and may leave his goods by will as freemen and clerks can.

He is to say every Sunday a mass of the day or of the Holy Trinity; every Monday for the souls of all the faithful departed; every Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday during the founder's life the Office for the Safety of the People for the founder and Cecilia his wife, with the prayer "Deus qui caritatis,"¹ and after his death he is to say the Office of the Dead for his soul, his wife's soul, and the souls of all his benefactors, and of all the faithful departed; every Friday a mass of the Holy Cross; every Saturday of the Virgin Mary; unless a Double Feast or other just cause prevent; yet when the Office of the Dead is not said a second prayer shall always be said for the founder and his relatives, etc., and the priest's intention in all prayers and masses shall be principally preserved to them [the founder, etc.]. Every day he shall say the full service of the Dead according to Sarum use, viz.: "Placebo" and "Dirige" with the commendation and accustomed prayers, and when he celebrates he shall have a clerk to serve at his own cost, and shall support all the burdens incumbent on the chantry. Dated Osmundeston, the Monday after the feast of S. John before the Latin Gate 1357.

Grant by the same to John de Stapulford, chaplain of the chantry, of 20s. annual rent, from all the lands, etc., of the grantor in Osmundeston, for the term of the lives of Alana, wife of William son of Ralph de Osmundeston, and Joan, wife of Roger de Duffeld of Derby, payable in equal portions at the Annunciation and Michaelmas, with power to distrain on all the said lands, whenever any payment is one month in arrear. The credentials of Robert, Bishop of Sevastopolis.²

Urban, Bishop, servant of the servants of the Lord, to our beloved son Robert de Hyntlisham, elect of Sevastopolis, greeting and apostolic benediction. Among the various anxieties by which we are constantly burdened, a specially pressing one is that the state of the churches committed by divine providence to our care may be both spiritually and temporally augmented. Over those churches which are known to be destitute of pastors and to deplore their vacancy, we study to set such ministers as shall by their rule promote this object. Whereas when William was presiding as Bishop over the Church of Sevastopolis, our predecessor, Pope Gregory XI, desiring that when it fell vacant a useful and fit person should be provided for it by the Apostolic See, specially reserved the provision for that turn to his own appointment and disposal; and whereas afterwards the said church by the death of the said William, which happened away from the Roman Curia, was left without a pastor,

and it pleased God to remove our said predecessor from our midst before he had provided for it: we, who have been raised to his lofty place, the vacancy having been certified to us, and the decree of reservation being a bar to action in the matter by anyone except the Roman Pontiff, not wishing the said church to be exposed to the inconveniences of a long vacancy, in our fatherly care and zeal, after diligent deliberation with our brethren, have at length turned the eyes of our mind upon thee, professed of the order of Friars of B. Mary of Mount Carmel, and in Priest's orders, of whose religious zeal, scholarship, honesty of life and morals, and other manifold gifts and virtues we have been assured, and, after due weighing of all, have accepted thy person, and by the counsel of our said brethren do provide thee to the said church, and do set thee over it as Bishop, and commit to thee the pastoral care and administration, in Him who giveth grace and bestoweth rewards, trusting that the right hand of the Lord assisting thee, the said church may be directed into prosperity and happiness under thy rule, and, the Lord giving health, may receive both spiritual and temporal increment. Wherefore we commit to thy discretion, as a charge laid on thee by the Lord, the care and administration of the rule of the said church; may'st thou so devoutly take it up, so healthfully carry it on, and so pursue it to its close, that the said church may rejoice that it has been committed to a fruitful administrator, and that thou may'st, beside the reward of eternal retribution, deserve to obtain the favour and blessing of us and the Apostolic See. Dated Rome, at S. Maria in the Transtiburine, iij. Non. Nov., the first year of our pontificate.
